• Aviatra Accelerators, located in Innovation Alley, has expanded into 112 Pike St as Aviatra Incubator. This 4,578 sq. ft. space offers co-working, events, pop-up retail, and short-term office leases. Supported by the City, Aviatra helped 1,029 women entrepreneurs in the region, a 16% increase since 2023.

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



The Covington Works Program, in its third year of partnership with the Northern Kentucky Area Development

District (NKY ADD), achieved a lot in 2024. Keu highlights include:

- 10 aspiring entrepreneurs were matched with Covington startups for 16-week paid internships through the NKU Center for Innovation and Entrepreneurship.
- · 49 Build ED Scholarships were awarded
- 12 individuals received transportation assistance to and from work.




Esperanza Latino Center received a City grant to support five bilingual

workforce development and entrepreneurship initiatives. These include a partnership with Enzweiler Building Institute to introduce trade programs to the Latino community and Holmes High School students.

The Enzweiler Building Institute's Covington Campus opened in Latonia in 2022 and focuses on high school students and others interested in the construction trades.

Part of our authenticity is our historic architecture and our largely intact urban fabric. To make sure we are the easiest community to work with while preserving what makes us real, we have design guidelines and a unique and innovative hybrid code. In 2024, a total of 824 zoning permits and Certificates of Appropriateness (COA) were issued - a 3% increase over the previous year. This included:

- 582 Zoning Permits.
- 183 COAs.
- 59 cases before the Board of Architectural Review and Development (B.O.A.R.D.).

More people are enhancing their residential or commercial spaces while preserving the city's historic character by complying with the user-friendly Neighborhood Zoning Code, adopted in 2020.




